April 23, 2023 Third Sunday of Easter

Dear Parishioner of Our Lady Star of the Sea,

Jesus "was with them at table." St. Luke, in today's Gospel reading (see Lk 24:13-35), shares with us the most heartwarming of the many remembrances of the disciples' first encounters with the Risen Lord. "He was made known to them in the breaking of bread."

That moment of recognition comes at the end of the story, not at its beginning. At first, the two disciples are moving out and away from the community. They had left behind the others and had left the city as well. And in their relative withdrawal are conversing and debating, looking downcast, hopes dashed. Being unable to see, foolish and slow of heart, they were, St. Luke tells us, unable to recognize Jesus. In their disabled state, Jesus initiates with them a real conversation. He "drew near and walked with them." He asks about their argument. And after cajoling them for their inability to understand "the things that happened," Jesus begins to speak genuinely to their hearts. He "interpreted to them what referred to him in all the Scriptures" in such a way that they would later recognize: "were not our hearts burning within us while he spoke to us on the way?"

They had come alive in a new way through the power of the Scriptures interpreted by the Lord. He helped them read the Scriptures not just as a thing in itself (a story, a prayer, some history, a teaching) but as a word of conversation, heart to heart, that refers to Jesus and his heart, to their own confused, broken hearts and to his love, his care and concern for them. The "things that happened" were not really about the betraval, denial, abandonment and loss that had consternated the wandering disciples. These "things" were really all about God's victorious love. In that love, Jesus himself would be "with them at table." With hearts moved by the word as Jesus "took bread, said the blessing broke it and gave it to them" the disciples were able to "recognize him in the breaking of bread." They found themselves, anew, as well.


St. Peter challenges you to "Conduct yourselves with reverence during the time of your sojourning" (see 1 Peter 1:17-21). Along the journey of these strange days and straining daze, we too can be unable to see or understand all the things that take place. It is then that the Lord, already present, seeks to open our hearts. He invites you to take up the Scriptures in a mode of conversation and to allow your heart to run more freely through its words. They are not about "things," but about Jesus and about you and about us. They are about the victory of his love that calls you to new strength and hope. Jesus responds well to your invitation for him to enter in, to "stay with us." Jesus himself, in his love, is "at table" with us as we gather at home with family, friends and loved ones. He is with us as we reach out to strangers and to the estranged sharing with them something of our blessings. He is with us here in the Eucharist as we break the bread in his name and at his word. Do you recognize him? Break the bread with him and for him and with and for one another. Let him help you recognize his presence. Let him help you find yourselves, too, anew.

During this coming May, I will schedule opportunities for general Parish meetings, now that our community has truly begun to come alive again after our Covid-19 and other challenges. Together we will look at our pastoral and financial state of health. Together will set our next priorities for our mission and for the care and strengthening of our families and community.

Comments from Deacon Joe Eastertide Continues

In *Desiderio Desideravi* Pope Francis reminds us of the new-born Church in the upper room after they had received the Holy Spirit on Pentecost. They are a community because they are forgiven, alive in Christ, and guided by the Spirit of Truth, and this community overcomes "spiritual individualism." For this community, knowing that Jesus is alive and present in his word, breaking the bread in the Eucharist is the prime means of encounter with him, as it is for us. "Only the Church of Pentecost can conceive of the human being as a person, open to a full relationship with God, with creation, and with one's brothers and sisters."

The people of today need to understand the meaning of the texts and rituals of the Mass because it is the whole Church that offers the Eucharistic sacrifice, not just the priest. This understanding isn't something we ever acquire completely. Since the mystery of the Eucharist is beyond our ability to fully comprehend, there is always the possibility of growing in our understanding of it. (Perhaps the book Jesus and the Jewish Roots of the Eucharist can be help to deepen our understanding. I'm happy that 200 copies have been taken by our parishioners.) Our learning about the Eucharist, our deepened understanding, should enable us to praise God better, thanking God "for the Passover of the Son whose

power reaches our lives." "The full extent of our formation is our conformation to Christ. I repeat: it does not have to do with an abstract mental process, but with becoming Him. ... Leo the Great writes, 'Our participation in the Body and Blood of Christ has no other end than to make us become that which we eat.""

On Monday I'll trek up to St. Anselm College to be present at the awarding of the first John S. Whipple Scholarship in Eighteenth Century Studies. I decided to fund this small scholarship in memory of my father, and the topic is because he used to say that if he could live at some other time he'd choose the 18th Century because there was "a ferment of ideas."

This week the Feast of St. Mark is Tuesday, April 25. The Gospel of St. Mark is the second in the New Testament, although it may well have been the first actually written. Mark was a companion of Peter as he traveled to Rome and lived there. He may also be the John Mark who is mentioned in Acts as a cousin of Barnabas and may also have accompanied Paul on some of his missionary journeys. Later he went to Alexandria in Egypt, where he founded the church and was its first bishop. His symbol is a winged lion, from a vision in the Book of Ezekiel. He is patron saint of Egypt and Venice.
