



November 19, 2023 Thirty-third Sunday in Ordinary Time

Dear Parishioner of Our Lady Star of the Sea,

"I will give you great responsibilities" (see Matthew 25:23). These words of today's Gospel remind us of the significance of the many blessings that God sends our way. Family, friends, insights, loves, country, talents, and successive new days, all these and more are great blessings. They are, at the same time, great responsibilities for each of us.

St. Paul writes(1Thes 5:6): "You are children of the light and children of the day." That joyful optimism should well be ours as we celebrate this week an early Thanksgiving Day. We are enlivened by the many blessings which are ours. We are, indeed, thankful for them each day. "Therefore, let us not sleep as the rest do, but let us stay alert and sober," as St. Paul reminds us. We ask the good Lord for the grace to welcome and to fulfill the great responsibility which each blessing entrusts to us. You and I are blessed in our abilities. You and I are enabled, capable of great things, even of that wonderful mystery of love of which the first reading speaks (see Proverbs 31:10-13, 19-20, 30-31). A husband treasures the gift of his wife's love: "Entrusting his heart to her." So does God give us the ability to receive his gift: he entrusts his heart to you and enables you to multiply the realization of that same gift.

"Talents... to each in according to his ability." As the Gospel account this weekend (see Matthew 25:14-30) looks to the end things, to the completion of time and of life, it refers to those gifts, "talents," that God has entrusted to us. The operative phrase in Matthew's presentation of this thought is the qualifier: 'each according to his ability.' Some may take that to mean the most able was given the most talents. I do not agree. If that were the case then the story describes a cruel set-up in which the least able person was given the least to work with and, thereby, the most difficult task. Money makes money, so the saying goes. The person with the five talents would have the easiest time to make more. No, the challenge of the parable is that the most able person was given the more difficult task: making something of the one gift given. That this person was quite able is demonstrated in his astute evaluation of the master: a demanding person, harvesting and gathering what was not planted nor sown. We must never, "out of fear" of the challenge, its demanding expectations or the prospects of failure, ever bury the gift given.

God has entrusted his "heart" to us, his loved ones. Fear not! He may not have given you the whole world at your beck and call, but he has given the one gift that counts. Much more than multiple talents, he has given of himself. Our great responsibility now is to share the gift. That's why we, now, in turn, do not bury the gift away in fear. That's why we seek to share and multiply that gift of love and life in all our words, all our deeds and all our ways. That's why we anticipate, when all is said and done, the wonder of hearing Jesus' word on the last of days: "Come, share your master's joy." It will happen if we share the Master's joy every day.

During the month of November, we remember our departed loved ones in a special way. The Book of Remembrance is in front of the St. Joseph statue and you are welcomed to submit the names of recently deceased there for inscription into the book and remembrance in our prayers.





Comments from Deacon Joe

Thanksgiving

It has always been a civil holiday, but it comes from a time when public authorities were participants in a shared faith in God which made it appropriate to express gratitude to him for all the blessings he had bestowed on us as a people. Certainly as Catholics we want to express our thanks to God always, and Thanksgiving Day is a good time to do so in a special way. If possible, please join your fellow parishioners at Mass that day at 9:00 a.m.

There will also be an interfaith Thanksgiving Service on Tuesday evening, November 21, at 5:30 p.m. at St. Andrew's Church on Lafayette St. It is good to join with other believers in God to pray in Thanksgiving for the blessings we receive as individuals and as a community. One of the good things in Marblehead is the respect our religious communities have for one another, as shown by the Interfaith Covenant. We had the Covenant on display in our Church a couple of years ago. Last year it was passed to Old North Church, and this year Old North will hand it on to St. Andrew's at the Thanksgiving Service. So if you can attend, it will show both gratitude to God and respect for those of other religions. Both are important.

I'll be out of town when both these events happen, but I strongly encourage you to attend them.

Thanksgiving Dinner Thanksgiving and Christmas can be poignant for people who no longer have family to celebrate with. When I was a boy ten or more of us across three generations would gather. The numbers increased and then gradually decreased as grandparents and uncles died and cousins moved away. For a while, my brother and I were hosted by our aunt. More recently friends took us in. If it weren't for such kind hospitality, I'd now find myself enjoying Thanksgiving dinner alone. I think I could find a way to make the dinner special even so. And I want to encourage any of you who find yourself alone on the holiday to somehow make it special. Maybe go to a restaurant that offers a good dinner, or order one to be delivered. Even just have something special for your homemade meal. Be in touch with relatives. Above all, rather than focusing on the loss of all the people from Thanksgivings past, focus on the good memories of those days. Be grateful for all that you were able to enjoy, and in this month of All Saints and All Souls re-

This week there are three obligatory memorials.

November 21 is the Memorial of the Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary. It is based on a story from before the year 200 that Mary's parents, Sts. Joachim and Ann, presented her to God in the Temple when she was about three. Fittingly for the one who was to be Mother of God, she was raised and educated there. November 21 is the date of the dedication of the Basilica of St. Mary the New in Jerusalem in



543. The basilica was built near the ruins of the Temple. Whether or not the story is historical fact, our lives, like Mary's, belong to God https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/ Presentation_of_Mary.



The virgin and martyr St. Cecilia is remembered on November 22. She is patron saint of musicians because the story of her martyrdom says that while musicians played for her unwanted wedding she sang to God in her heart. She was probably martyred around the year 230. She is depicted in the window in our choir loft <u>https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/</u>

Saint Cecilia.

The Memorial of St. Andrew Dung-Lac and companions is November 24. St. Andrew was a Vietnamese priest who was martyred in 1839. He is one of 117 martyrs who were killed in persecutions in the 18th and 19th Centuries who were canonized by Pope St. John Paul II in 1988. It is estimated that in addition to those individuals between 170,000 and 300,000 were killed for the faith between 1745 and 1862 https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Vietnamese Martyrs.
