October 15, 2023 Twenty-eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Dear Parishioner of Our Lady Star of the Sea,

"Come to the Feast!" These words of today's Gospel (see Matthew 22:1-14) come from the Parable of the Wedding Feast. You and I are called to a feast of love and of life. We are called to live and to love to the measure of God's own life and love. If we limit our concern to just ourselves, our ways, our needs, we are cut off and do not find the fullness for which our hearts seek. If we recognize the depth and breadth of God's invitation to us and seek to reflect it in our love for our neighbor, then, and only then, do we come to full life in the power of God's saving invitation to us and to our world.

The parable asks us to reflect on our experience of life and of two principal dimensions of our destiny in God. First, life is no mere material circumstance. Rather, life is a Word of Invitation from God to share his joy with all: "Go out, therefore, into the main roads and invite to the feast whomsoever you find." The second dimension is that life invites a quality of total response. The fact of our response and in the quality of the response is represented in the parable by the wearing of a proper wedding garment. Our engagement in the joy of life is meant to show!

In the parable, as in life, many of the initially invited were not ready, nor worthy, to come. They understand life to be a measure of their own interests, needs and wants, and their own presumed advantage. They are too busy with the circumstances of life to respond to life itself, the Word of Invitation.

Yet, the invitation of Life-in-God is extended to everyone. Our equality before life is based on that fact, not the facts of circumstance, which vary. "The Lord of hosts will provide for all peoples... the Lord God will wipe away the tears from every face" (see Isaiah 25:6-10a). St. Paul seeks to share with us his discovery: "In *every* circumstance and in *all* things I have learned the secret..." The measure of God's love communicated in the Word of Invitation is to be the measure of our own love and service in Christ. When we recognize the depth and breadth of God's invitation to us and seek to reflect it in our love for our neighbor, then, and only then, do we come to full life in the power of God's saving invitation to us and to our world.

A wide and comprehensive grasp of the love of God for our human family and God's invitation to us all to enter into the heart of this love by sharing it widely should be our aim. It is the prime foundation for the community of mind and spirit that is the focus of the current Synod on Synodality taking place in Rome. We are asked to pray that our Church community can discover effective dynamics of appreciation, respect and cooperation in dealing with challenging topics that are based in the workings of God's own grace. In this, we are called to witness to the world that it is possible to work towards comprehensive and real agreement over difficult divides. We are to show a way forward better than the polarization and mutual accusation that has become endemic in our own society and in our world. The dangers of terrible violence and loss of life that we see flaring in our world can be avoided. All peoples have been called to life by God. Our effective communion with our brothers and sisters helps us find our way forward.

Here at Star of the Sea, we are seeking a Parish Office Secretary to assist with our life and work. Effective skills in welcoming parishioners and patiently seeking solutions to various needs are the heart of the service. Principal responsibilities will focus on communications, and include interacting with all the components of the parish community. Work will include also telephone, email, scheduling, Bulletin and website. Strong computer skills in MS Office and an ability for multi-tasking are essential for the work to be shared. Thursday, October 19 at 6:30 PM ~ 9:30 PM. or Saturday, October 21 at 9:00 AM ~ 12:00 PM.



Comments from Deacon Joe

"Nothing has changed."

Monsignor McCarthy, the pastor of this parish in the 1960's, occasionally said, "nothing has changed," after the Second Vatican Council. In a sense that was true, but it depends on what you mean by "thing" and "change."

There is the story about the old man who was being interviewed. The interviewer said, "I suppose you've seen a lot of changes in your life." The man answered, "Yep. Opposed them all." It seems to be natural for us to think that the way things are when we first observe them is how they're supposed to be, maybe even how they've always been. So we think that's how they have stay or should have stayed. But change in human affairs is constant, even in the Church. The bishops at the Council of Nicæa did not celebrate the "Traditional Latin Mass" or employ the theology of Thomas Aquinas, who wrote centuries later. God has revealed himself to us in the person of Jesus and in the Sacred Scriptures, and through the centuries we have come to understand that revelation more clearly and express our understanding in various ways. We have worshipped God and celebrated the sacraments in different ways.

What we always hope is that changes in our words and practice will be improvements. This brings us to the Synod meeting now in Rome. We have the guarantee that the Church will not fall into actual error, but it is possible that the results of the Synod will be less than the best they could be in enabling the Church to spread the gospel and help us all grow in holiness. So we pray that the participants will discern where the Holy Spirit wishes to lead them. We can be confident that nothing will change in what is essential for fidelity to the gospel, while we hope that any changes in nonessentials will be useful for our life and work as God's people now and in the future

This week the Memorial of St. Ignatius of Antioch, bishop and martyr, is October 17. He was taken from Antioch to Rome about the year 107 to be thrown to wild animals.

On the way he wrote letters to several churches These letters express the faith of the Church and tell us something about how local churches were organized around a bishop with priests and deacons.


