October 29, 2023 Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Dear Parishioner of Our Lady Star of the Sea,

"You shall love the Lord your God with your whole heart... you shall love your neighbor as yourself." These words from Matthew's Gospel (see Mt 22:34-40) form not only the heart of our prayers this weekend, but the foundation of our spiritual lives. Jesus says that the whole law and the prophets depend on this love. We can say that everything depends on this love.

Jesus responds to a test leveled at him by a scholar of the Law by responding in a way expected of every pious Jew (Love your God with your whole heart.... the greatest). At the same time, he changes the context by adding to the greatest a "second" command (love your neighbor as yourself). And he then says that this second is "like" the greatest.

Jesus is not saying that the two commands are grammatical or even notionally alike. The similarity he points to is intrinsic. To obey the one you must also obey the other. To love God with all your heart, all your soul, all you mind is, at the same time, to love each and everyone God loves and to do so to the measure of God's loving. And, to love your neighbor as you yourself have been loved by God is, at the same time, to love God but to fail to love effectively one's neighbor. Also, any claim to truly love one's human neighbor and at the same time to fail to effectively acknowledge and honor God. One who claims to love God religiously but does not attend to the reality of relationship with those whom God loves, love pretentiously. He does not know God with any depth. One who claims to love neighbor and serve humanity without knowing God loves shallowly, mistaking a passing effort of his own making for the inestimable depths of love and life that only God is and can give. In Jesus, love of God and love of neighbor is one and the same love, love in its full. All real love depends on this love.

On the first two days of November each year, we celebrate All Saints' Day (November 1) and All Souls' Day (November 2). With the Solemnity of All Saints we rejoice in the victory of all those, known and unknown, who have lived lives of holiness. We recall the goodness they have brought the world and the happiness towards which we, in the world, are called in God's love. Our society today has such need of looking higher, more nobly and more deeply towards that wonder of love God calls us to live each day. On All Souls' Day, we remember all those who have died, especially our loved ones and those through whom we have received gifts of life and of faith. We join our prayer to that of Christ, in and through whom alone are our lives brought to the perfection of grace in God's own love.



If you knit, sew or crochet and would like to make items at home to be sold at the Fair, you may do so.



Comments from Deacon Joe

Three Books and a Video

We are in the Year of Parish Revival which is the second phase of the National Eucharistic Revival. https://eucharisticrevival.org/



It "is a movement to restore understanding and devotion to this great mystery here in the United States by helping us renew our worship of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist." The hope is that we'll be able to have small group sessions here in the parish, sort of like "Arise," focusing on the meaning of the Eucharist in our lives.

Meanwhile, there are three books which can help us understand the Mass better. There is the one which we made available last spring: Jesus and the Jewish Roots of the Eucharist, by Brant Pitre. It shows how Jesus' giving his disciples his body and blood at the Last Supper fulfills expectations of Jewish faith. Next comes This Is My Body, by Bishop Robert Barron. It was the basis for our recent women's retreat. In it Bishop Barron analyzes the Mass as a community meal and as the supreme sacrifice, both with deep roots in the Old Testament, and the resulting Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. Finally I'll mention The Lamb's Supper, by Scott Hahn. He looks at the Mass as our earthly participation in the heavenly worship of Jesus Christ as the Lamb of God, which we see in the Book of Revelation. I think any and all of these books make worthwhile reading. There was also a brief video shown at the end of the women's retreat called "The Veil Removed." https://theveilremoved.com It is "a visual representation of how all heaven and earth unite to celebrate the Holy Eucharist." As Scott Hahn puts it, when we're at Mass we're in heaven.

All of these should help us realize what a privilege it is and what a joy it should be to be at Mass.

Correction Last Sunday I wrote about two women Rabbi Schwartz spoke of at the Interfaith Service, women who had been active in fostering Israeli-Palestinian friendship. I mistakenly wrote that both had been murdered by Hamas. Only one was murdered; the other was kidnapped.

This week we celebrate the Solemnity of All Saints, a Holyday of Obligation, on November 1. Mass will be offered at 9:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. This is a day when we honor not only the saints with recognized days in the Church calendar, but also those who don't "rate" a memorial. It includes all those in heaven who have never been canonized: good people of the past, family, friends — the vast multitude whom no one can count — who have accepted God's saving love and are now with God in eternal joy and glory. We honor them and we ask them all to pray for us that we will join them when our earthly life is over.

November 2 is the Commemoration of All Souls, when we pray for all the departed who are saved but who need or needed to be purified from lingering attachments to sin, a purification which happens in Purgatory. (Since God is eternal, he knows our prayers from all eternity, so it even makes sense to pray for people who died long ago.) In addition to our regular morning Mass, we will have the Mass of Remembrance at 7:00 p.m., when we will pray especially for those of our parish who have died within the past twelve months.

The Memorial of St. Charles Borromeo is on November 4. He was born into a high noble family of Milan in 1538 and was made a cardinal at the age of 21 by his uncle, Pope Pius IV. Despite all that he lived simply. He was active in the Council of Trent and was appointed Archbishop of Milan in 1564. For twenty years, despite opposition, he was vigorous in implementing the reforms decreed by Trent, especially for the proper education of the clergy. To further the reforms, he called



eleven diocesan synods and five provincial councils (including dioceses in Milan's "province"). At the conclave in 1566, he supported the election of St. Pius V to succeed Pius IV When plague struck Milan in 1576, he organized relief efforts and spent his family fortune to try to feed 60,000 or more people every day. He died on November 3, 1584, and was canonized in 1610 by Pope Paul V He is an inspiring example of a good bishop. https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Charles_Borromeo
